Minnesota Transfer Curriculum Package

The Minnesota Transfer Curriculum is the means by which a student transfers a complete package of lower division general education from one Minnesota State Colleges and Universities to another. At Minnesota State College Southeast this is accomplished by a minimum of 40 credits with course requirements in each of the 10 goal areas as designated below. If a course is eligible for multiple goals, the additional goal(s) is listed in parenthesis, however, credits for any course may count only once towards the minimum 40 credits. Students must maintain a minimum cumulative G.P.A. of 2.0 in these courses to transfer this package. The MnTC grade point average will be calculated using grades of A - D (passing grades earned) in all MnTC courses, including both Southeast and transfer grades.

1. Written and Oral Communications – (9 credits – to include COMM1218, ENGL1215 and ENGL2525) Goal: To develop writers and speakers who use the English language effectively and who read, write, and listen critically.
