

Educational Pathway Opportunities in Nursing

Minnesota State has a statewide nursing program transfer agreement for Practical Nursing Diploma to Associate of Science in Nursing which supports a smooth articulation pathway. All Associate of Science in Nursing (ASN) programs in Minnesota are required by the Minnesota Board of Nursing to grant advanced standing credits to Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs) with unencumbered licenses.

LPN to ASN

This option allows you to become an RN by getting an Associate of Science in Nursing and becoming eligible to take the NCLEX-RN® exam.

 - 3 semesters of general education courses followed by 3 semesters of nursing
- [Minnesota West Community and Technical College](#)
 - Specifically an LPN to ASN program
 - Two semesters of nursing classes after pre-requisite general education classes
 - Accredited by ACEN
- [Inver Hills Community College](#)
 - Accredited by ACEN
- [Rochester Community and Technical College](#)
 - 6 credits of advanced standing awarded to LPNs
 - 3 semesters to graduation after completing required general education courses
 - Must take an ATI TEAS exam before applying.
- [Riverland Community College](#)
 - 5 credits of advanced standing awarded to LPN's
 - 3 semesters of nursing after general education requirements complete
 - Must take an ATI TEAS exam before applying.
 - Accredited by ACEN

LPNs are also eligible to apply to LPN to Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) Completion Programs. Several accredited online LPN to BSN options are available. Please note that there is normally a clinical component required which the student may need to arrange close to their residence, and sometimes limited on-campus requirements, depending on the program.

LPN to BSN

This option allows you to become an RN by getting a Bachelor of Science in Nursing and becoming eligible to take the NCLEX-RN® exam.

 - Offered in Minnesota with clinicals in the area
 - Must have valid LPN license from SD, MN, ND, IA, WI, WY or NE
 - On-line coursework
- [Indiana State University](#)
 - Accredited by ACEN
 - General education requirements followed by four semesters of nursing
 - Clinical arranged in local area
 - Public college
- [North Dakota State University](#)
 - Must have 60 college credits to apply
 - Offers in-state tuition rates
 - Accredited by CCNE
 - Validation exams (NCAE II) must be taken on campus
 - Starts once per year (spring semester)
 - Occasional time on campus as well as time in clinicals in the summer
 - Public college

 - Entrance testing exams required
 - Public college

ASN to BSN

This option allows an Associate Degree Registered Nurse (RN) to complete a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing. Minnesota State has a statewide nursing program transfer agreement for the Associate of Science in Nursing degree to Baccalaureate of Science in Nursing (RN to BSN) which supports a smooth articulation pathway amongst Minnesota State programs.
